Hello and a Happy Holiday Season to You!

As a token of our appreciation to you we are including a keychain with a tumbled stone as a gift in each mailing this month. We hope you enjoy it as much as we do....I (Christine) have a clear quartz one and Lora has an amethyst one.

<u>Featured Mineral:</u> This month we are happy to present to you, hyalite a type of opal that was collected in Zacatecas in North Central Mexico. There are two types of opal, one that is opalescent and often seen in jewelry which is considered the "precious" variety of opal. The second type of opal is not opalescent and considered the "common" variety of opal. Hyalite is the common variety which is transparent and when the light reflects on it has a beautiful play of colors.

It has a lustrous, transparent appearance that is a bubble-like, botryoidal coating that sits atop an altered granite matrix. You can see a dance of colors as the light and it fluoresces in daylight which is a property rarely found in other minerals



**Coming in January:** Halite from Searles Lake in Trona California will be the featured mineral of the month. Halite is an evaporate mineral occurs as perfectly-shaped, translucent, cubic crystals that are either a light gray or pale pink in color. The pink color, as our write-up will explain, is created by reddish pigments produced by halobacteria (salt-loving bacteria) that thrive in the Searles Lake brine.
